## Aeolus Chapter 7 of Joyce's Ulysses

The reference to North Earl Street in Joyce's Ulysses is a reference to **Meagher's Pub**, located at 4 North Earl Street.

it is in this pub that **Leopald Bloom** lends 3 shillings to a character, Hynes, around the last week of May 1904. Seeing Hynes many times during the day of Bloomsday, Leopald Bloom thinks twice of collecting the debt.

This is perhaps of more significance than it might appear at face value because Bloom is (being of Jewish extraction) harangued for the traditional accusation of being "tight" with money. In fact Bloom is one of the more generous characters in the book.
